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108 Rescued Beagles Arrive in San Diego

Dogs spared from mass-breeding research facility for animal testing

SAN DIEGO — San Diego Humane Society is welcoming 108 of the 4,000 beagles who are part of a large-scale rescue from a Virginia-based company that breeds and sells animals for use in scientific testing. The beagles arrived on a <u>Greater Goods Charities</u> flight <u>sponsored by iheartdogs.com</u> at Gillespie Field in El Cajon on Aug. 31, 2022 and were then transported to San Diego Humane Society's El Cajon Campus for intake and exams.

The beagles were removed from <u>Envigo</u>, a company that breeds animals for medical testing, after a lawsuit filed by the Department of Justice in May that <u>detailed</u> <u>horrific violations of the Animal Welfare Act</u>. The <u>Humane Society of the United States</u> (HSUS) is leading the effort to remove and place the rescued beagles. San Diego Humane Society is not affiliated with HSUS, but often partners with the organization to better the lives of animals in need.



This is a major operation and shelters across the country are stepping up to care for the beagles. **"For our staff** and volunteers, this day could not come soon enough," said San Diego Humane Society President and CEO Dr. Gary Weitzman. "This has been one of the busiest and most challenging summers in recent memory. But we are here to help animals who need us. These beagles deserve this second chance and we're very glad to be able to open our doors to them, just as we will soon ask our community to do."

San Diego Humane Society welcomed all 108 beagles and provided immediate care for them at its El Cajon Campus. The organization had foster volunteers ready to help care for the beagles. Approximately 50 of the beagles will stay with SDHS fosters until adoption. San Diego Humane Society will be placing the other beagles with a variety of other animal welfare organizations, including San Diego Animal Welfare Coalition partners Rancho Coastal Humane Society and PAWS of Coronado.

This is the second airlift that Greater Good Charities has conducted to help safely rehome the beagles being removed from Envigo. The first flight took place on Aug. 20 and transported 146 beagles to Portland, Ore.

"Transferring these Beagles to Rancho Coastal Humane Society is nothing new for us," said Rancho Coastal Humane Society President and CEO Judi Sanzo. "About 95% of the pets adopted here have been transferred from our rescue partners through our FOCAS (Friends of County Animal Shelters) program. Most of the pets we bring in come from southern California. In this case, our arms had to stretch a little farther to reach out and rescue these Beagles when they need us most."

"Like many other municipal animal shelters and animal rescue organizations, PAWS has been burdened with higher than normal animal inventory and complex veterinary medical cases," said PAWS of Coronado Sr. Manager of Fund Development Jennifer Stein. "However, we are excited to share some of our rescue resources with two of these beagles. Fortunately, unlike most of our new, incoming dogs, we have a chance to prepare for their care in advance. The ability to anticipate these needs is what allows to assist with their placement. PAWS is dedicated to supporting animal welfare in Coronado as well as across the bridge. We look forward to supporting these pups."
