Shelter Mews

Most pets live with their families or are waiting at the shelter for a new family.

But there are some cats that do not have a family and rely on the community members to care for them. They are called community cats and live outside all the time in neighborhoods all over the United States. Community cats may either be afraid of people or friendly, born in the wild or left behind. Many rely on kind neighbors to care for them by providing food and water, while others must find ways to survive on their own just like a wild animal. You can help community cats (with help from your parents) by making sure they have shelter, food and water or by bringing them to San Diego Humane Society to receive their spay or neuter surgery and vaccines. After the surgery, we ask that they be returned to the exact same spot they were found. Their ear will be clipped so others know that they have been helped. This process, called Trap-Neuter-Return, is practiced by many shelters around the country in order to make sure community cats are being taken care of.



Wildlife Window

Have you ever seen a mountain lion in San Diego?

Most people have not, but mountain lions do live here! Mountain lions are quiet and solitary animals. They are very beneficial to keeping our ecosystems balanced. Because they hunt mostly deer, they help to keep deer overpopulation under control. As with all wildlife, never approach a mountain lion if you do encounter one, and be aware of your surroundings at dusk, dawn and night! Read signage and be cautious when hiking in areas that are known for mountain lions. You can help by being aware and giving them the respect they deserve.

- Scissors

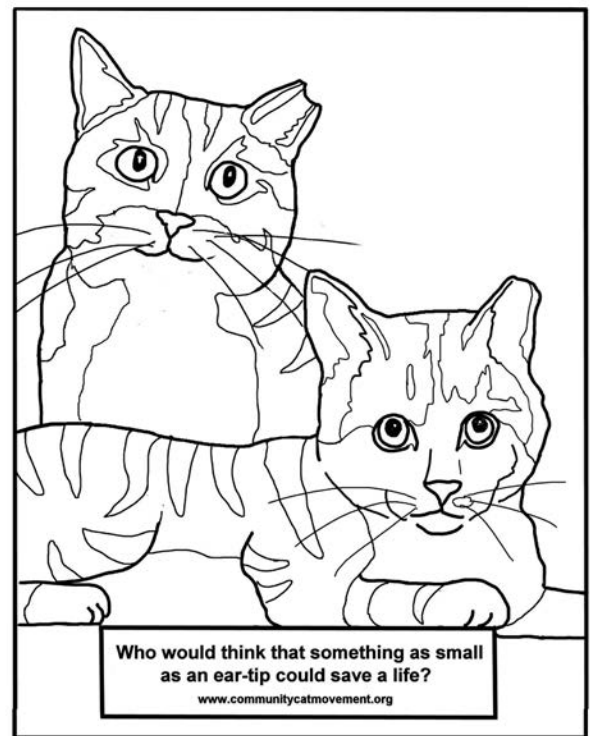
INSTRUCTIONS:
