As our pets age, it is important that we remember to give them Lots of Love while also paying attention to their changing needs.

Older pets may need more rest and less play time, but they will still need special time with you. Your pet may be able to tell you what they prefer to do, so watch their body language and try to find the right activity that they will enjoy. If playing fetch is too active for your dog, she may prefer taking shorter but more frequent walks with you instead. If your kitty needs an extra-long nap, let him sleep, and then when he wakes up, you can have his favorite toy ready to play with! Show your senior pet you care!

Did you know that Project Wildlife cares for wildlife that cannot go back to the wild?

These special animals came in badly injured and were not able to survive on their own if released. In addition to their injuries, these animals also had an unlikely and special connection to humans, allowing them to become education ambassadors who now teach San Diegans about their cousins in the wild. While with us, they spend their lives in the most natural environment we can provide for them. We understand that they are still wild animals, so we do not treat them like pets. We provide them with the right food and proper enrichment to keep their minds and bodies active. This barn owl, Uguku, came into Project Wildlife in 2004 when he fell from his nest. He recently retired after doing education programs for 14 years and will live out his days receiving the same quality attention and care in his ambassador habitat.

## **Lend a Paw**

Make an enriching toy for your senior pet! Snuffle mats are a fun puzzle to keep your pets thinking and using their senses to find a yummy treat, and they don't require a lot of physical activity!




#### **Materials:**

- Rubber Sink Mat (12" x 15" works well)
- Fleece material (about 1.5 yards)

#### **Instructions:**

- 1. Cut the fleece into strips about 1" wide by 6" long.
- 2. Starting at the edge of the mat, take a strip of fleece and push one end through the first hole of the first row and the other through the second. Flip the mat over and tie the strip in a knot.
- 3. Repeat this process until all the holes in the mat have been filled in both horizontally and vertically (up and down). When looking at the top, the fleece should be thick enough so that none of the mat is showing.
- 4. Place treats throughout the fleece and watch your pet snuffle around to find them!
